Dear Parents and Carers,

We would like to wish you a very happy Christmas break, whatever you and your family are doing, and hope that the New Year brings lots of lovely things.

It has been a very busy term in school. We would like to send out a few thank you messages, celebrate some lovely things that have happened this term and update you with some things coming up.

A few highlights of the term

Our new Nursery and Reception children have settled into school life brilliantly. We are looking forward to meeting some more new nursery children in January.

We have had some very successful parent events including the forest school curriculum afternoons and reading workshops. Thank you for giving your time to support us and your children with these.

We have taken part in a large number of sporting events this term including; a tour of the Ethiad stadium, fun runs, dodgeball tournaments, orienteering, table tennis tournament, boccia tournament, cricket, football tournament and a bowling tournament. The children look so smart when they go out in the school team kit and always represent us, you and themselves brilliantly.

We had some great Money matters talks from a visiting speaker, helping the children prepare for their future.

The Rocksteady concert was a resounding success again, the children are so brave to perform in front of such a large audience and it is clear to see how much progress they are making in their lessons. Year six children are each assigned a job to help around school, this may be hearing readers, helping in the hall, being sports leaders at playtimes, running a homework club or being IT monitors. They have taken on these roles very well and have shown how responsible they can be, well done year 6!

A huge thank you to our new cook Vicky, who made cooking Christmas dinner for more than 450 people look easy (although we know it wasn't). Thank you to all of you who came and joined us for lunch and had such kind words afterwards. It has been lovely to receive thank you emails from a few of you, it means such a lot.

A thank you to you, as parents, for continuing to support your child's education by supporting with homework, reading and making sure they are at school every day and on time. I would also like to thank you for supporting our community events like the curriculum afternoons and the reading events. It is great to see you in school.

give to our families who need a bit of extra help at the minute. You were so generous and we were able to make some wonderful hampers, thank you.

We also have some wonderful people who give up their time to hear readers in school, this is invaluable for the children who need that extra bit of help. Pupil voice

We have new head and deputy head pupils who meet with myself several times a term to discuss how we can continue to improve our academy. Our new school council has also been elected, the council is supported by Mrs Jones. They have already started to discuss ideas for this year.

A group of children have now received training from The Diana Anti-bullying Association and are now our antibullying ambassadors. Their first job was to rewrite the children's anti-bullying policy. They are now working on an action plan to show the work they plan to do.

We also have two wellbeing ambassadors. They work alongside With Me In Mind to ensure that we are doing all we can to support children's wellbeing. They have been running a wellbeing Wednesday club where children can drop in to talk through any worries they have. We are looking at how we can further extend this over the academic year.

Moving our curriculum forward

We are always looking at ways that we can develop teaching and learning at our academy. This year has seen the introduction of Mastery number in early years and key stage one. The programme is really helping the children with the basics of number that then supports them in their daily maths lessons.

All of our staff received Read, Write Inc. training. This has helped develop our daily phonics session. Following this training we have reviewed how we teach phonics, relooked at some of the interventions we put in place for children and changed the process for sending home reading books in key stage one.

Celebrating Christmas

It has been such a lovely Christmas in school! Year 5 and 6 conducted their carol service at St Oswald's church and all of the other year groups entertained their friends and families with their carol services at school. We are very proud that every child is given the opportunity to be involved in a performance at this time of year and we think they all did brilliantly. We were overwhelmed by the number of family members who came to see the carol services, thank you for coming to celebrate with us.

Our choir visited Greenacres to sing for the residents. The children thoroughly enjoyed this and a few asked if we could make this a regular occurrence, they would like to visit throughout the year to spend time with the residents, possibly doing craft activities or playing games. We are going to see if this can be arranged for later this year.

A great night was had by all at the Panto at the Baths Hall (even if a few parents fell afoul of Annie Fanny's tricks)! I love going to the panto with the school community and seeing everyone have such a good time. We sell tickets for the Panto every year in June or July. Online safety at Christmas

Technology is now a very popular item on many children's Christmas lists with tablets, smartphones, game consoles and smartwatches likely to be asked for this year.

Whilst we want children to enjoy their presents, it is also important that parents look at ways to ensure that their children use these devices safely.

This includes setting parental controls and understanding that video games have PEGI ratings similar to the classification for films.

Other things that you may want to consider is managing screen time so that you can monitor the amount of time being spent on each device and set boundaries such as not letting your child take the device into their rooms at bedtime as this can affect their sleep.

Finally, make sure that you find time to talk to your children about online safety.

Communicating with you.

We continue to communicate with our parents via the following methods in order to reduce our carbon footprint and cut down on our paper use.

<u>Email</u>-updates and letters are emailed. Please check your emails regularly and let us know if you change your email address or have problems with getting emails from the academy.

<u>Text message</u> – we will text you with urgent alerts or reminders. If an important letter is sent which requires immediate attention we will also send you a text message however, we will not do this for every letter.

<u>Website</u> – Each class has a class page on the website, they update this half termly with a curriculum overview, this will allow you to see what your child is learning that term. The class teacher will also post a weekly class news item which will contain pictures and information about what the class has been doing that week. It is a good way for you to see what is happening in school on a regular basis.
