



Parent survey – July 2023

Thank you to all the parents who took the time to complete our recent parental questionnaire.

106 parents responded to the questionnaire (which means that each response equates to just under 1%), the results are below.

You said	What we have done/ are going to do next
9% disagreed that the academy makes sure the children behave well	We have introduced a new behaviour tracker system, which is monitored weekly by members of the senior leadership team. This means that we can intervene in a timelier manner and quickly put in support when it is needed.



	<p>The new system will also help us to inform parents in a timely manner if their child's behaviour is starting to slip so we can work together to support them.</p> <p>We have re-established the academy's rules and expectations in assembly, making it very clear to the children what the rewards are for positive behaviour and the consequences of poor choices.</p> <p>We will review the behaviour policy and share this with parents so that we are all clear as to the academy's approach to behaviour management.</p>
6 % of parents disagreed that the school dealt with bullying quickly and effectively. 11% said they do not know.	<p>Anti - bullying is the main focus for school council this year.</p> <p>The school council will be writing a new children's anti-bullying policy.</p> <p>We will work with children and parents to raising awareness of what constitutes bullying.</p>
15% of parents felt that school did not make them aware of what their child will learn during the year.	<p>Each half term we publish an outline of what children will be learning on their class page on the website, this will continue.</p> <p>We will now email parents with this document each half term as well as putting it on the website.</p> <p>Parents can find a curriculum map for each year group on our website on this page. This shows an overview of what the children will learn each year.</p> <p>We will continue to post on Twitter and on the class pages of the website to show what the children have been learning that week.</p> <p>Nursery, reception and year 1 will continue to use tapestry to communicate to parents.</p> <p><i>Please let us know if you would like to suggest another way that we can communicate what the children will be learning</i></p>
